



Investigations Unit

The Investigations unit is staffed by a Detective Sergeant, two general detectives and one part-time detective. The part-time detective is assigned to the patrol unit and splits time between patrol duties and investigations. In addition, the Investigations Unit has a full-time narcotics detective assigned to the DEA task force and a full-time detective assigned to the P.A.T.R.O.L. Auto Theft Task Force. The Investigation Unit worked on over 200 cases in 2012, most of which were felony crimes. The detectives prepared and executed more than 30 search and seizure warrants related to those investigations.

The Investigations Unit worked on many serious felony crimes that consisted of sexual crimes, crimes against children, fraud and felony assault/domestic violence. Some of the highlighted cases from late 2011 and 2012 are as follows:

In 2011, patrol officers responded to the scene of an attempted pharmacy robbery at the Rite-Aide. The suspect was gone, but had left several drops of blood inside and outside of the store. The blood was submitted to the Washington State Patrol crime lab and a DNA profile was obtained which matched a known offender. Charges for attempted robbery are pending.

Also in late 2011, patrol officers responded to a report of a commercial burglary at a local dentist's office. Access to the business was gained by breaking a large window. The suspect was cut during the burglary and left blood on the glass. The blood samples were submitted to the Washington State Patrol Crime Laboratory and a DNA profile was obtained which matched a known offender. The suspect has been charged with Burglary and is awaiting trial.

In 2011, Detectives investigated a missing person case which eventually led to the discovery of the victim's badly burned body. The victim's boyfriend was arrested for homicide and pled guilty to murder in 2012. He received 240 months in prison for his crime.

Detectives assisted the Ketchikan, Alaska Police Department with a Sexual Assault Investigation by conducting a series of interviews with victims of their suspect who reside in the State of Washington. The investigation ultimately assisted in reaching in a plea deal of over 14 years in Alaska.

Detectives investigated a string of approximately eleven (11) commercial burglaries that occurred on the SR 410 corridor. As result of an undercover operation with the assistance of CRU members a suspect was taken in to custody while in the process of trying to break in to a dentist office. The investigation resulted in a prison sentence.

Detectives investigated a sexual assault of three (3) minors that lead to a seizure of persons warrant having to be served on a business in Issaquah due to the failure to cooperate with law enforcement in taking the suspect in to custody.

Detectives investigated a neighborhood complaint that lead to three separate arrests for the possession and delivery of narcotics that ultimately lead to a conviction and prison sentence.

Detectives investigated a home invasion where someone forcibly entered an occupied residence. The homeowner was awakened by the noise and confronted a man in his home. The homeowner shot at the suspect, but did not hit him. The suspect was later identified and located by patrol and was interviewed by Detectives. The suspects confessed to the crime and later plead guilty in Pierce County Superior Court.

Detectives investigated a voyeurism case, where a man placed a hidden camera in the bathroom at a party. The camera was discovered and had captured several people using the bathroom. The case was referred to the prosecutor and the subject has been charged with several counts of voyeurism. He is currently awaiting trial.

Detectives and the Crime Response Unit investigated a domestic violence assault where the suspect shot at his girlfriend as she was fleeing the couple's home. The suspect fled the scene and was captured within hours in Federal Way by Detectives.

Detectives investigated a female using another person's identity to obtain prescription drugs. The female was arrested and charged with multiple counts of identity theft and prescription forgery.

Detectives investigated a drug related homicide. The victim attempted to rob two drug dealers of their illegal product, but was shot and killed by the dealers in the process. Four people were arrested and are currently awaiting trial.

Detectives assisted with several investigations as part of the Pierce County Metro Crime Response Unit including; A homicide in Sumner, two officer involved shootings in Lakewood and Sumner, the aforementioned drug related homicide and a domestic violence assault shooting in Bonney Lake, a Shooting in Milton and an armed robbery in Fife.

Detectives participated in several specialized training classes including: Oregon/Washington Lawman's conference, Asset Forfeiture, and presented and trained department personnel with the new Death Investigation checklist and procedure.

Detectives also conducted several background investigations for new employee/volunteers.

Detective Boyle was the task force officer for most of the year. While Detective Boyle was assigned to the Patrol as an Acting Sergeant, Officer Vance stepped up to take his place.

The Task Force initiated 65 cases, closing 36 of those. The Task Force arrested 44 suspects, filing a total of 204 felony charges against them.

In 2012 Detective Boyle, Officer Vance, and other members of the Patrol Task Force recovered 83 stolen vehicles. The combined value of these vehicles was \$501, 431.00.

Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT)

The Metro SWAT team is a part-time, multi-agency tactical team which consists of officers from the Bonney Lake, DuPont, Fife, Lakewood, Milton, Orting, Puyallup, Steilacoom, and Sumner Police Departments. The SWAT team is responsible for responding to high-risk incidents in the participating cities. In 2012, the Bonney Lake Police Department had three officers who were assigned to the Metro SWAT team as an additional collateral duty.



The Metro SWAT team successfully completed 21 missions in 2012, which was a significant increase from 16 missions the previous year. In 2012, the Metro SWAT team was utilized for protection details, serving felony arrest warrants, search warrants for stolen firearms, and 14 high-risk search warrants.



In addition to responding to high-risk situations, members of Metro SWAT provide training to local police agencies in the areas of firearms, patrol tactics, active-shooter response, high risk entries, and defensive tactics. Metro SWAT members also assisted with providing instruction to several area fire departments on the topic of Active Shooter Response.

Records & Administrative Assistant

In 2012 Records unit consists of Barb Wigton, Heather Tower, Jaime Amsbaugh and Louise Emry as our Administrative Assistant. Tower and Amsbaugh handle most of the customer service including the front window and phones. They also work with case reports, handle Public Disclosure requests, are records specialists when it comes to retention policies. Wigton helps out the detectives with copying evidence for large cases, putting together investigation case books as well as being the lead fingerprint operator.



During the 2012 Citizens Academy Amsbaugh and Tower did a half hour presentation on records, informing the students about Public Disclosure, Concealed Pistol License (CPL) and the general process of what goes on behind the scenes in the Records Unit.

With the continued increase of CPL's, Amsbaugh took a refresher training on guns instructed by FBI/NICS, DOL and ATF. The entire records unit continues to provide the public with outstanding, professional, friendly service.

Our Administrative Assistant, Louise Emry handles the work load between all of the command staff as well as handles the budget details and backs up records when necessary.

Traffic Unit / MCRT

Officers Sainati and Torgerson did their best to promote safer streets through education and enforcement in 2012. The two officers wrote a total of 2414 infractions/citations in 2012. Investigated collisions were up this year to 198, from 191 in 2011. Unfortunately, there was one fatality collision investigated in the City of Bonney Lake this year. A citizen walking along 214th Ave E was struck and killed by a pickup truck which had left the roadway. After an investigation by BLPD and the Metro Collision Response Team (MCRT), the driver of the pickup truck was charged with vehicular homicide in the case.

Officer Sainati continues to ride his BMW motorcycle in nearly all weather conditions. He uses the motorcycle in support of various departmental and community functions outside of traffic enforcement. These functions include department open houses, Bonney Lake Day and parade, and officer funeral and memorial duties.

In 2012, elements of the Metro Collision Response Team responded to one callout, the previously mentioned car vs. pedestrian fatality collision. MCRT personnel taught a Basic Collision Investigation class hosted at Lakewood PD. Several BLPD Officers completed this course.



Tacoma/Pierce County DUI Task Force

The Bonney Lake Police Department has continued its participation in the Tacoma/Pierce County DUI Task Force. The task force is designed for law enforcement agencies in Pierce County to work as a cooperative group to concentrate DUI and traffic enforcement efforts throughout various locations in Pierce County. Each month, officers from these different agencies work DUI or speed emphasis in the local area of the host agency. The DUI Task Force was developed in 1983 when citizens were appointed by Tacoma and Pierce County elected officials to design and implement an education, public information, and enforcement program. Since that time, the program's scope and community involvement has continued to expand and has evolved into today's DUI Task Force.

Bonney Lake Traffic & Patrol Officers worked DUI and/or speed emphasis in Lakewood, Tacoma, Gig Harbor/Kitsap County, University Place, Puyallup, Bonney Lake/Sumner/Buckley and areas of unincorporated Pierce County.

The Bonney Lake Police Department continued its participation in the Washington State Patrol's Target Zero Team. Target Zero is the state's strategic highway safety plan, and calls for reducing highway deaths to zero by the year 2030. The entire plan can be found at www.targetzero.com.

Enforcement is one of four equal strategies of Target Zero, along with engineering, education and emergency medical service. Bonney Lake's own DUI Enforcer, Officer Rob Hoag, has represented BLPD in this program for the last three years. When he participates in these patrols he regularly makes

one to two DUI arrests per shift. Officer Hoag conducted these patrols in Bonney Lake, as well as other areas of Pierce County. Officer Hoag made a total of 10 DUI arrests while on TZT patrol. Officer Hoag is constantly Bonney Lake's award winning DUI enforcer.

Grants from the Washington State Traffic Safety Commission reimburse law enforcement agencies' salaries for their involvement in these programs.

K-9 Program

Throughout the year of 2012, Officer VanSickle K9-50 and his dog Gunner deployed a total of 14 times. They were called from outside agencies several times, but were often cancelled while responding to the requested location.



In 2012, Officer VanSickle and Gunner recovered marijuana multiple times, and some glass pipes used for smoking methamphetamine.

K-9 Gunner was retired January 1, 2013. Officer VanSickle has since returned to patrol. The BLPD K-9 program is currently suspended until the funding for a tracking dog is obtained and a tracking dog is purchased.

Officer Jeff Bourbon continued into phase 2 of the FTO Program as the year began. Officer Bourbon finished the entire FTO Program and has since passed his probation.

Officer Ryan Harberts graduated from the Criminal Justice Training Commission (CJTC) and has completed the initial phases of the FTO Program. Officer Harberts is currently a solo-probationary Officer within the FTO Program. FTO James Larsen is currently assigned as Officer Harberts FTO and is completing monthly observation reports (MOR's).

The FTO's worked with our current Reserve Officers throughout the year.

Crime Prevention and Community Events

The property room began the year with the annual appropriated property audit. There is approximately 105 items that are appropriated to various officers or work spaces within the department and three items were depleted through department training. Due to the Narcotic Canine Program being discontinued, 14 drug paraphernalia items were returned for destruction.

We received and processed into our evidence room approximately 1027 items for 2012. We processed 51 release requests for return of property to the applicable owners/victims.

The property officers continue their efforts in property room management by the disposing of evidence that is no longer required to be retained in the evidence room. Through case research, we were able to dispose or destroy 73 items for 2012. ****Either traded or destroyed**

We had a total of 182 items of drugs and 665 items of property that were destroyed. A total amount of 22 firearms were disposed of this year with 8 firearms being traded to Surplus Ammo & Arms for store credit and 14 firearms being destroyed.

There was a total of 104 items that went to Propertyroom.com for auction that generated a total of \$1536.48 in additional funds for the department.

The Tacoma – Pierce County medicine disposal box located in the front lobby of the Police Department has been a successful drop-off location for citizens to safely dispose of both prescription and over-the-counter medications that have expired or no longer wish to have in their homes. The approximate total package weight collection (TPW) totals for this year was 112 lbs. of medications.

Program communication issues continue to hamper our progress in getting an effective bar code system up and functioning in the property room. The communication issues with the handheld scanner are currently being analyzed and we continue to be hopeful for a successful bar coding system in the property room in the near future.

This year we implemented an online Residential Vacation Check that can be found on the City of Bonney Lake website for citizens to have a Community Service Officer check on residences while owners are on vacation or away for an extended period of time. We had 5 requests fulfilled for the 2012 year.

In a concerted effort to reduce jail costs as well as offering the Bonney Lake Municipal Court an alternative sentencing option, the Jail Alternative Day Reporting Program (also known as Day Court) was implemented in 2012. This program mandates that defendants report to the court on regular court sessions and to remain in the courtroom until the conclusion of the session. In return, the defendant receives credit for 1 day served in jail.

Since implementation of the program in early spring, we had 21 individuals successfully complete their day court commitment for a combined total of 87 days, representing a cost savings of \$5,220.00. There were a total of 9 who failed to appear with a combined total of 504 days incomplete.

Community Service Officers of the Bonney Lake Police Department continued their excellent work in supporting our Patrol officers, Sergeants, and Command Staff in 2012. Community Service Officers (CSO's) also worked to promote Crime Prevention and Community Oriented Policing in both the residential and business community. CSO Steve Flaherty received the "2012 Support Officer of the Year" for his outstanding work. Although CSO's have a wide range of duties and responsibilities there are several which are considered their primary duties: prisoner transport, BLMC Court Security, property room management, electronic home monitoring, and Crime Analysis. CSO Miller is our Crime Analysis. She also is assigned to the south King/North Pierce Regional Auto Theft Task Force called P.A.T.R.O.L.

This year there continues to be more than enough prisoners for CSO's to transport from the jails of Pierce and King County. CSO's transported 316 prisoners to and from various jails for booking or appearances at Bonney Lake Municipal Court. We returned 115 of those same prisoners back to their respective jails. CSO's also transported 23 Felony suspects to Pierce County Jail. In late November our primary jail in Buckley closed and we now are traveling to Enumclaw, Puyallup and Fife Jails with our misdemeanor prisoners.



We continue to provide expanded court security due to increased number of traffic court sessions and the additional Show Cause hearings held on Mondays. In November Bonney Lake Municipal added the City of Eatonville to the court docket. Since November we have seen an increase in court attendance and the length of regular court sessions. CSO's provide between 16 and 24 hours of Court Security for Bonney Lake Municipal Court per week at Justice Center. A full year of operations in the new courtroom continues to provide a more professional demeanor of both criminal and traffic Court. Our full time Prosecutor has improved our ability to anticipate potential security problems although we have seen an increase in people held for bond or taken in custody at court.

CSO Flaherty and Yanez also provide court ordered Electronic Home Monitoring and Day Court for some offenders who have been convicted of Bonney Lake Municipal Court charges. Electronic Home Detention reduces jail cost and allows offenders to work while serving their sentences. Day Court allows prisoners a chance to serve their time in the courtroom instead of being jailed. CSO's supervised an average of 2 to 3 Day Jail prisoners per week during 2012. The EHM program provided 630 days of monitoring for a savings of \$35,910.00 in jail costs in 2012. CSO Flaherty also worked with the City Prosecutor and City Attorney to update the EHM application forms and process this year.



Throughout the year, CSO's have worked on a large variety of community and school events. The year began and ended with tours of the Bonney Lake Police Department for local Girl and Cub Scouts. Packs from Bonney Lake fulfilled merit badge requirements by touring the Bonney Lake Police Department. CSO's also gave a tour to Bonney Lake Co-op Pre-School in February. Favorite stops at the police department were the holding cells, the Patrol vehicle, and the SWAT armored vehicle. Lakeridge Middle School 7th and 8th grade classes joined BLMC staff conducting a mock court session in June at the Justice Center. CSOs also worked with job shadows from Bonney High School conducting tours of the PD, Bonney Lake Municipal Court, and transports. CSOs also worked with an Intern from Pierce College during Fall Quarter.



CSOs supported local businesses throughout the year. CSO's attended Safety Fairs at Fred Meyer (July), Lowes (Oct) and worked with Target and their sponsorship of NNO and Shop with a Cop. Applebee's and Lowes sponsored a breakfast and car wash in support of our first Chief for a Day event. CSOs supported all of these events in 2012.

In March CSO Flaherty, Sgt. Sasaki and Officer Green coordinated BLPD's annual Citizens Academy. The Academy was in session through April and gave local citizens an idea of the type of training received and situations encountered by BLPD officers. This years Academy included fire-arms simulator training, and emergency vehicle operations (driving police cars). This year's academy

returned to the traditional schedule, and it was an excellent group to work with. The new Citizens Academy Banner was used at the summer events to increase our visibility at community events. It was displayed at Bonney Lake Days and Open House. The Academy class for 2013 was scheduled in December.

The CSO's are responsible for developing and maintaining Block Watches within the City. Ongoing efforts are focused on local homeowner associations. Successful areas include Lake Bonney Home Owners Association (coordinated with Pierce County Safe Streets), Cedarview and Sky Island. Successful meetings were held with groups from Sky Island HOA, Lake Jane HOA, Willow Brook HOA and Quiet Meadows HOA.



There were several major events this year beginning with Chief for Day, a year long tribute to a local child with ongoing major health problems. Chief Knight attended all of our major events this year and was honored at a regional celebration in August. CSOs assisted command staff raising funds and participating in the Chief for Day event at the Criminal Justice Training Center. CSOs continuing last years format of local community's sponsorship of separate events, the PD parade went to Sky Island Park and Lake Jane. The first stop at Sky Island Park for root beer floats was met by a large and enthusiastic crowd. The second stop at Lake Jane Park was for a hot dog barbecue. CSOs had been

working with the Lake Jane HOA for a second year. The NNO event continues to be most attended event in Lake Jane in recent years. The Lake Jane Board was very pleased and is interested in the event for next year. Lake Jane was the first NNO event to be held in an HOA Park. They were pleased with the turnout and welcomed the City to their park. Added to the event at Lake Jane was the movie Cars 2 this was made possible with help from the cities Special Event Budget. National Night Out held, at two community parks, in partnership with in the local block watches created a more relaxed and informal event. Bonney Lake Police and East Pierce Fire caravanned to each location. The caravan was lead by our Motor Patrol Officer and many Police vehicles, SWAT armored vehicle and Fire vehicles. Target, a national sponsor, was helpful in providing hotdogs and ice cream for the event. Home Depot, also a national sponsor, provided a kids workshop designing decorative tiles. The Bonney Lake High School cheerleaders brought pep and face painting to the event. CSO's working with excellent support from the Police Department, and City of Bonney Lake Officials and Staff, coordinated the event.

The second major event in August was participation with other city staff in Bonney Lake Days. CSO's and BLPD volunteers brought a full range of crime prevention and personal safety information to the City of Bonney Lake's booth. Officers, volunteers, and CSO's were available for the one day event answering questions, meeting the public, and recruiting for next years Citizen's Academy.



The third major event was the BLPD/Public Safety Open House. The Public Safety Open House was held in the equipment bays of East Pierce Fire & Rescue. This event is a combined annual event held with East Pierce Fire. The Open House showcases each department's officers, specialty units, and volunteers. The BLPD displays included personnel from SWAT, K-9, Marine Services, Motor Patrol, Bicycle Patrol, CSO's, McGruff the Crime Dog, and our volunteers. Demonstrations and displays included K-9, SWAT equipment, the 911 Simulator, BLPD's Marine Service Boat, SWAT, and the ID-A-Kid. Volunteers using our new sign recruited for the 2013 Citizen's Academy.

We finished the year by participating in the Shop with a Cop program which was sponsored by Bonney Lake Target. CSOs, Volunteers, McGruff and the SRO worked in early November soliciting donations from Target shoppers. Over \$1500.00 was raised to support 20 kids in our December Shop with a Cop event. BLPD staff and volunteers also worked to support the Bonney Lake Giving Tree, Toys for Tots and Bonney Lake's annual food drive. This department wide effort made our agency look like Santa's workshop during the holiday.

CSOs also participated in Party Patrol in April, Touch a Truck in August, Sky Island Halloween Security Detail and ID a Kid and Drug Drop Off day in November.

CSOs were able to enhance our Crime Prevention program by using the cities web site to add an e-mail Block Watch and newsletter to the cities Facebook page and are now using the web for crime prevention alerts and tips. Using volunteers, Car Prowl handouts were distributed in parking lots during the holiday season.



The Volunteer program grew this year with four volunteers added from the Citizen's academy this year. Nine volunteers gave over 138 hours of time and energy to the police department in 2012. They were at every major event.

Working together the Bonney Lake Police Department was once again successful in both maintaining Public Safety and providing Community Service and Education to the Citizens of Bonney Lake.

Reserve Officer Nate Alvord worked a total of 177 hours in 2012. Officer Alvord was short of the required 240 hours per year. Alvord works night shift and grave yard patrol with his assigned FTO's. Alvord has volunteered to assist with City events and directed traffic during a fall event.

Officer Alvord is a very hard working person. He finds time to work here, often times after working his full time job. Nate has shown a great determination to learn as much as possible. Both of his assigned FTO's say that he is fun to be around and learns quickly from his mistakes. Nate is determined to be a full time Police Officer.

Reserve Officer Alvord is right where he should be in the FTO program at this time. I hope that this year he can begin to drive the patrol car and take the next step at getting released from the Reserve FTO program.

Reserve Officer Emily Holznagel worked a total of 250 hours in 2012. Officer Holznagel was 10 hours over the required 240 hours per year. Holznagel works night shift and grave yard patrol with her assigned FTO's. She assists at City events, and has volunteered here at the Police Department, all on her own time.

Officer Holznagel is a very determined person. She arrives for her patrol shift early and is well prepared. This is usually after working her full time job. Holznagel is constantly looking to learn as much as possible about police work.

Reserve Officer Holznagel has had challenges with communication. FTO Kiblinger and FTO Scott have both expressed concern with Holznagel's lack of command presence. At times, she has not stepped up and taken control during stressful situations and even on routine paper calls. Her communication skills have lacked and continue to be a concern. However, Holznagel has shown improvement and continues to work hard. I have encouraged both FTO's to get Officer Holznagel more involved at calls and during stressful situations so she can get over the shock of having to take control. At this time, she has a great attitude and is determined to become a well rounded patrol officer.



Crime and Statistics

CSO Miller

The National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is an incident-based reporting system for crimes known to the police. For each crime incident coming to the attention of law enforcement, a variety of data are collected about the incident. These data include the nature and types of specific offenses in the incident, characteristics of the victim(s) and offender(s), types and value of property stolen and recovered, and characteristics of persons arrested in connection with a crime incident.

The total number of NIBRS offenses reported to Bonney Lake Police Department in 2012 was 1,100 compared to 1,153 reported offenses in 2011. This resulted in a 4.6% overall decrease.

One homicide was reported in 2012 and four individuals were subsequently arrested. The case was a drug deal turned robbery. Robbery showed a significant increase of 75% with 7 robberies reported in 2012 compared to 4 robberies in 2011.

Forcible sex offenses, Aggravated Assault and Simple Assault all showed significant decreases. Drug/Narcotics related offenses decreased by 27% and Weapons Law violations decreased by 20% in 2012, likely a result of new laws pertaining to the search of vehicles incident to an arrest.

CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY GRANT \$270,000.00 FUNDS

After much discussion and receipt of feedback from Washington's child passenger safety (CPS) team leaders, the Washington Traffic Safety Commission (WTSC) brought key stakeholders to the same table. On May 24, 2011 representatives from all over the state met to:

- Clarify the core functions of the WTSC's CPS program.
- Offer input that will help shape the future of the WTSC CPS program.

Resulting from the meeting was the establishment of a CPS Program Vision of Zero deaths and serious injuries involving children (up to age 13) from motor vehicle crashes in Washington. Every child under age 13 in Washington rides properly restrained, in accordance with Washington's CPS LAW and furthermore, the following Objectives and Strategies were created to increase correct seat belt and child restraint use:



2.2.A Increase driver compliance with Child Passenger Safety (CPS) law

2.2. A1 Develop (or identify) and distribute educational materials appropriate for a law enforcement audience about the CPS law.

2.2. A2 Conduct trainings at Target Zero Manager law enforcement meetings.

2.2. A3 Train new (and experienced) law enforcement in collaboration with the Criminal Justice Training Commission and the WSP academy.

2.2. A4. Conduct educational programs that involve law enforcement.

2.2. A5 Implement "Click it or Ticket-style" CPS-focused projects and measure their effectiveness.

2.2.B Improve driver compliance with CPS law by educating parents about the law, emphasizing major areas of non-compliance

2.2. B1 Develop (and/or locate) educational materials appropriate for the audiences, giving special emphasis to areas where crash data shows most mistakes are being made. Recruit feedback from parents about the usefulness of educational materials prior to dissemination.

2.2. B2 Using appropriate data, identify pilot counties and undertake educational projects. Measure the impact of the projects in comparison with Click it or Ticket model projects.

2.2. B3 Provide educational materials for CPS advocates and parents statewide.

2.2. B4 Maintain an 800-number where people can get questions answered, and a website where they can get educational materials.

2.2. B5 Distribute educational materials via Department of Health Child Profile mailings where appropriate.

2.2. C Conduct proactive communication with CPS technicians, instructors and other interested stakeholders.

2.2. C1 Identify CPS Team Leaders in every major city (and lesser populated cities where appropriate) and task them with leading CPS efforts. Use CPS Team Leaders in the dissemination of communication, materials and resources.

2.2. C2 Develop and work with a Steering Committee of stakeholders from all areas of the state to share information about CPS developments and project implementation.

2.2. C3 Develop an email list of CPS Leaders, technicians and technician trainers (and others interested in child passenger safety), and regularly communicate with them about emerging CPS issues and opportunities.

2.2. C4 Using email lists, notify the CPS community regularly about the availability of technician trainings, child car seat recalls and other information of interest.

2.2.D Promote the correct installation of child restraints with community-level check-up events organized by volunteer CPS technicians.

2.2. D1 Provide support for Team Leaders who sponsor technician trainings. Supply trainers and materials where appropriate.

2.2. D2 Provide mini grants to Team Leaders to use for checkup events, for material support and for purchasing child car seats where appropriate.

2.2. D3 Help Team Leaders track the training needs of their technicians. Develop a master list of all trained child passenger safety technicians (those who are currently trained, who have expressed an interest in getting trained, and whose certification has elapsed). Notify Team Leaders when their technicians' certification is coming due.

2.2. D4 Promote child car seat recycle programs modeled after the Kent, WA program.

2.2. E Increase the visibility of CPS issues in WA.

2.2. E1 Send out regular news releases about CPS issues to statewide media.

2.2. E2 Develop news releases that can be localized by Team Leaders and help facilitate their interaction with their local media.

2.2. E3 Develop educational materials (PSA, print ad slicks) on CPS themes and promote their use by the media.

2.2. F Measure the effectiveness of the CPS Program

2.2. F1 Conduct yearly observational surveys to determine compliance with WA's CPS law.

2.2. F2 Conduct a twice-yearly survey of CPS stakeholders to determine their satisfaction with the program.

2.2. F3 Measure the impact of educational programs conducted at pilot sites.

2.2. F4 Measure (with parent feedback) the effectiveness of educational materials prior to their dissemination.

2.2. F5 Working with radio stations in three media markets, conduct listener surveys to determine parental compliance with CPS law .

2.2. F6 Standardize the form used at child car seat checkup events so that only one form is used. Analyze information received to determine major patterns of incorrect restraint use and share this information with CPS stakeholders.

Child Passenger Safety Cont. Manager Cesi Velez

The method of supporting child passenger safety efforts throughout Washington was altered to incorporate these new changes. The WTSC held a competitive grant process and interviewed several candidates/agencies who expressed interest and demonstrated the necessary commitment and skills set to initiate the program statewide. The Project Manager was identified and is housed at the Bonney Lake Police Department in Pierce County, Washington. The responsibilities commenced on January 1, 2012.

During the FFY 2011-2012 the following was offered:

- 13 Child Passenger Safety Technician training courses
- 93 students attended the courses to obtain car seat technician certification
- Classes held in the following cities: Bellevue, Coupeville, DuPont, Everett, Kirkland, Puyallup (2), Quincy, Seattle, Spokane, Sumner, Twisp
- 3 Renewal classes for expired car seat technicians
- 11 students obtained recertification
- Classes held in the following cities: Friday Harbor, Longview, and Twisp



With the above trainings, Washington currently has 451 nationally certified car seat technicians; 26 of which are certified instructors. This shows a slight decrease from 2010-2011 with 487. The focus has been to recruit and train dedicated individuals and partner with supportive agencies by strongly encouraging the attendance to a Car Seat Awareness class prior to attending the four day technician training. The desire is to seek those who will more likely have a long term commitment to child passenger safety and not allow a lapse in their certification after two years.

Washington had 245 technicians eligible for recertification; of which 127 did complete their recertification (51.8%).

A network of CPS Team Leaders has been established by the Project Manager; this core group of active safety advocates consists of 24 Target Zero Managers, 18 SafeKids Coalitions, and seven local child passenger safety teams.

A grant process was established and made available to CPS teams April of 2012. This process is new and has never been utilized by the teams in the past. The goal is to provide funding directly to the local community; allowing them to determine the needs of their local community. It also provides classes, training opportunities, and LOCAL support to help encourage consistency and reliability. The following activities were supported by this grant process:

Purchase of car seats	\$4,791.59
Educational materials	\$6,380.70
*CPS Team support	\$15,957.12

*CPS team support may include supplies, certification course, opportunities to obtain continuing education units, instructors to conduct seat sign-offs, latch manuals, awareness class, manufacturer instruction CD's, etc.

Grantees must provide information which demonstrates the distribution of car seats funded and purchased through this grant process going to families who have demonstrated a financial need. Most programs accomplish this through referrals from state or federally funded programs targeting low income families.

Between October 1, 2011 and September 30, 2012, child passenger safety technicians representing 30 active teams in Washington reached their communities in 1,105 different child passenger safety events. Through their efforts...

- 5,836 car seats were inspected
- 3,092 seats provided to families in need
- 347,709 people were reached with education
- +9262,196 pieces of educational material was distributed

The Project Manager of Washington's Child Passenger Safety program traveled to meet, in person, the hardworking child passenger safety advocates in Washington. Site visits were conducted from Asotin County over to Clallam County. She participated in 73 activities; reached 5,572; distributed 10,486 pieces of material; and inspected 17 car seats.


