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

Message From the Chief

It was another exciting year for the Bonney Lake Police Department. In February, investigators wrapped up a 3 month investigation which netted over 100 mature marijuana plants, vehicles, a residence in Cedarview, and over 3000 in cash. In March the City of Bonney Lake made the purchase of a new marine services vessel to take the place of the older model. The new vessel is designed to make patrols on the water safer for both officers and for the boaters we come in contact with.

This year we added a prescription pill drop off box out in the lobby of the Public Safety Building. We worked with our Community Services Officers to begin a new service with Property Room.Com. This company assists our department with the auction of unclaimed property or property that is forfeited.

In June we placed an officer on the Civil Disturbance team with the help of an outside agency loaning us the equipment. CDT is part of the Metro Cooperative Cities group that helps make our small department have all the expertise and equipment as a larger department. We also took the lead in the Metro Collision Team. This is a new concept based off all of the other cooperative cities concepts of metro teams. This program is taking some time to get started; however with all good programs a lot of though must go into it.

We once again staffed Allen Yorke Park with police officers to prevent and to minimize criminal activity. In 2010 we had a cooler than usual summer thus reducing our activity in the park compared to 2009. We welcomed two reserves to our Police family. Reserve Officer Ryan Harberts and Lance Panush. Both completed the reserve academy in 2010 and began phases two and three of the FTO program.

We did see a new challenge this year in regards to our search and seizure laws which limits our vehicles searches during arrests; however with that said, Officer VanSickle and his partner Gunner made the most out of this program and continued to work hard during the year.

Our CSO were busy as usual coordinating the court rooms, transports, property room, special projects such as National Night Out, Open House, Shop with a Cop to name a few. They were also busy working with our neighbors with block watch programs.

Our Traffic Unit was working hard as usual. Not only are they making sure speeds are appropriate on our city roads, they are also helping out with our community functions such as Open House, National Night Out and Shop with a Cop. They are very proactive and are now part of the Metro Collision Response Team.

Again, I hope you enjoy learning more about what we did in 2010 as your read our report.

Investigations Unit

The Investigations Unit is staffed by a Detective Sergeant, two general Detectives and two part-time Investigators. The part-time Investigators are assigned to the patrol division and split time assisting in Investigations. In addition, the Investigations Unit has a full-time narcotics Detective assigned to the Drug Enforcement Administration's Tacoma Resident Office and a full-time auto theft Detective assigned to the PATROL auto theft task force

A total of 338 cases were assigned for investigation in 2010. That number is up from 292 in 2009. Of those cases, 76 resulted in the arrest of the suspect(s) and/or the case was referred to the Prosecutor for charging. 90 cases were cleared "resolved" with no charges filed or the case was referred to another agency for follow up. All other cases were placed in a suspended status, pending new leads.

Detectives took part in over hours of specialized training in 2010.

The Investigations Unit also participates in the Crime Response Unit (C.R.U.), a multi-jurisdictional investigations team for major crimes.

Some of the highlighted cases from 2010 are as follows;

Detectives investigated and tip regarding the smell of growing marijuana. Detectives later executed search warrants and discovered a large marijuana growing operation. Two subjects were arrested and charged with Unlawful Manufacturing of a Controlled Substance. Civil forfeiture of personal property is still pending.

Detectives identified and arrested Michael Chavis in Eastern Washington for Armed Robbery of the Rite-Aide earlier in the year. Chavis confessed to the crime. He later plead guilty in Pierce County Superior Court to one count of Robbery in the Second Degree.

Marshall Tidwell and a juvenile accomplice were arrested by patrol during the commission of a residential burglary. Detectives linked both subjects to several additional burglaries in the area. Tidwell later plead guilty to Residential Burglary and Trafficking Stolen Property.

Detectives assisted the Fife Police Department with the investigation of an officer involved shooting.

Detectives investigated an internal complaint of theft by an employee at East Pierce Fire and Rescue. The investigation revealed that Firefighter Shane McBane had stolen several hundred dollars from a fund associated with bicycle helmets and life jackets. McBane was arrested following the investigation.

The Detective division conducted an internal investigation of several Bonney Lake Officers stemming from a complaint by the Washington State Traffic Safety Commission. A police department Sergeant resigned as a result of the investigation.

The Detective Sergeant conducted an internal investigation of a Bonney Lake Officer. The officer was found to have violated policy.

Investigations Con't.

Detectives investigated a shooting incident where a resident shot at a person repossessing her boyfriend's vehicle. The female subject is awaiting trial.

Detectives investigated several different Organized Retail Theft rings that were targeting stores in the Western Washington. Multiple arrests were made and one of the rings was charged in Federal Court for violations of the United States Code.

Detectives took part in a multi jurisdictional Identity Theft Investigation which resulted in the arrest of James Shafer. Shafer later plead guilty to 2 counts of Identity Theft First Degree, 12 counts of Identity Theft Second Degree and 2 counts of Forgery. Mr. Shafer was given an exceptional sentence of 100 months in prison.

Detectives investigated an extensive vehicle prowling case in the Brookwater housing development that led to the arrest of two subjects.

Detectives participated in Pierce County Gang Task Force investigations.

BLPD Investigations TNET

The Bonney Lake Police Department (BLPD) continues to participate in the Tacoma Narcotics Enforcement Team (TNET) by supplying a full time Narcotics Detective to the Drug Enforcement Administration's (DEA) Tacoma Resident Office (Tacoma RO). The DEA's Tacoma RO is comprised of DEA Special Agents and Detective's from a variety of local Police agencies. Each Detective assigned to the Tacoma RO is commissioned as a Federal Task Force Officer (TFO's) and investigate both State and Federal level narcotics investigations. Detective Morrow is currently BLPD's representative at the Tacoma RO.

In 2010, the Tacoma RO initiated several narcotics investigations which led to the arrest of 115 individuals for federal and state prosecution.

The Tacoma RO seized approximately \$748,168 dollars in US Currency in addition to real property, vehicles, etc... for a total of \$1,904,524 dollars. In addition to the actual seized amount, the Tacoma RO is currently in forfeiture proceedings to seize approximately \$1,474,624 dollars in total value of assets (currency, vehicles, property).

The total amounts of narcotics seized in 2010 by the Tacoma RO were as follows;

Methamphetamine.....– 96.92 lbs.
Cocaine.....– 127 lbs / 57.6 kilos
Heroin.....– 85.5 lbs
OxyContin/Oxycodone.....– 4.07 lbs (Approximately 3,500 tablets).
MDMA/Ecstasy.....– 22.27 lbs (Approximately 10,000 tablets).
Marijuana.....– 44.19 lbs (Approximately 1,319 Plants).

BLPD Investigations TNET Con't.

Some of the highlighted cases from 2010 are as follows;

The Tacoma RO was involved in a four month joint Title III wiretap investigation with the Grays Harbor Drug Task Force (GHDTF), Thurston County Narcotics Team (TNT) and Lakewood PD. The case involved a Mexican Drug Trafficking Organization (DTO) known as the VARGAS DTO. The investigation expanded from Washington State, to southern California and into Mexico. The investigation resulted in 35 arrests and led to the seizure of approximately 83 lbs of heroin, US currency and numerous vehicles.

In addition to the above lengthy investigation, Detective Morrow was case agent/co-case agent in the dismantlement of three separate organizations/investigations. The first investigation led to the arrest of the main target and the seizure of approximately 10 pounds of methamphetamine, one pound of heroin, multiple ounces of cocaine and ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars. The second investigation led to the arrest of three subjects and the seizure of three pounds of methamphetamine. The most recent investigation resulted in the arrest of five subjects and the seizure of one pound of methamphetamine and one pound of heroin. Detective Morrow currently has four open investigations for Fiscal Year 2011 with several investigative leads for additional future targets of investigation.

Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT)

The Metro SWAT team is a multi-agency tactical team which consists of officers from the Bonney Lake, Dupont, Fife, Lakewood, Milton, Orting, Puyallup, Steilacoom, and Sumner Police Departments. The SWAT team is responsible for responding to high-risk incidents in the participating cities.

The Metro SWAT team successfully completed 22 missions in 2010, which was a significant increase from 14 missions the previous year. In 2010, the Metro SWAT team was utilized for 4 armed barricaded subjects, and 18 high-risk warrants.

In addition to responding to high-risk situations, members of Metro SWAT provide training to local police agencies in the areas of firearms, patrol tactics, active-shooter response, high risk entries, and defensive tactics. Metro SWAT members also assisted with providing instruction to several area fire departments on the topic of Active Shooter Response.

The Bonney Lake Police Department currently has four officers who are members of the Metro SWAT team. Two officers are on the entry team, one officer is the team leader of the sniper element, and one officer is a hostage negotiator.



Traffic Unit

In 2010, Officers Sainati and Torgerson continued their quest for safer streets. The two officers wrote a total of 2630 infractions/citations in 2010, approximately 33% of all written department wide. Anecdotally, officers are reporting it's much more challenging to find speed violations. For the last several years officers have been working parking violations with much success as evidenced by a 46% drop in parking infractions from 2009 to 2010. In 2009 a total of 660 parking violations were written, with only 356 written in 2010.

Officer Sainati continues to ride his BMW motorcycle in nearly all weather conditions. He uses the motorcycle in support of various departmental and community functions outside of traffic enforcement. These functions include department open houses, Bonney Lake Day and parade, and officer funeral and memorial duties.

In 2010, the Bonney Lake Police Department began the process of forming a Metro Collision Response Team. This team is planned to be modeled after other successful Metro teams. This team will be formed with officers of BLPD along with the cities of Fife, Lakewood, Sumner, Puyallup, and Lakewood. The team would respond to fatality and serious injury collisions, officer involved collisions, and other situations that might overtax member city's departments. It is expected that this team will allow for extra training opportunities and result in more experienced investigators.



Tacoma/Pierce County DUI Task Force

The Bonney Lake Police Department has continued its participation in the Tacoma/Pierce County DUI Task Force. The task force is designed for law enforcement agencies in Pierce County to work as a cooperative group to concentrate DUI and traffic enforcement efforts throughout various locations in Pierce County. Each month, officers from these different agencies work DUI or speed emphasis in the local area of the host agency. The DUI Task Force was developed in 1983 when citizens were appointed by Tacoma and Pierce County elected officials to design and implement an education, public information, and enforcement program. Since that time, the program's scope and community involvement has continued to expand and has evolved into today's DUI Task Force.

Bonney Lake Traffic & Patrol Officers worked DUI and/or speed emphasis in Lakewood, Tacoma, Gig Harbor/Kitsap County, University Place, Puyallup, Bonney Lake/Sumner/Buckley and areas of unincorporated Pierce County.

This year the Bonney Lake Police Department began participating in the Washington State Patrol's Target Zero Team. Target Zero is the state's strategic highway safety plan, and calls for reducing highway deaths to zero by the year 2030. The entire plan can be found at www.targetzero.com.



Tacoma/Pierce County DUI Task Force Con't



Enforcement is one of four equal strategies of Target Zero, along with engineering, education and emergency medical service. Bonney Lake's own DUI Enforcer, Officer Rob Hoag, has stepped up and taken on the task of representing BLPD in this program. A grant from the Washington State Traffic Safety Commission reimburses law enforcement agencies' salaries for their involvement in the program.

The Bonney Lake Police Department is also involved in the Task Force's partner program, the Party Intervention Patrol. This is a cooperative group of law enforcement agencies focusing their enforcement actions on under aged drinking parties in Pierce County. Law enforcement agencies are joined by medical personnel, counselors/social workers and parents to respond, enforce, educate, treat and/or prosecute minors for under aged drinking. Pierce County and the Bonney Lake Police Department have been involved in implementing the program county wide. Officer Nathan Vance has taken on a leadership role with the patrol, and his work reflects positively on the City of Bonney Lake.



Auto Theft Task Force

Crime Prevention and Community Events

Community Service Officers of the Bonney Lake Police Department continued their excellent work in supporting our patrol officers, sergeants, and command staff in 2010. Community Service Officers (CSO's) also worked to promote crime prevention and community oriented policing in both the residential and business community. CSO Kristine Yanez was hired in April 2009. She brings previous law enforcement experience to BLPD and successfully completed her training in 2010. CSO Miller has moved from a part-time CSO to full time by adding her crime analyst talents to the Auto Theft Task Force.

Although CSO's have a wide range of duties and responsibilities there are several which can be considered primary they included: Prisoner Transport, BLMC Court Security, Property Room Management and Electronic Home Monitoring. Again this year there continues to be more than enough prisoners for CSO's to transport from the jails of Pierce County and King County. CSO's transported over 400 prisoners to and from various jails for booking or appearances at Bonney Lake Municipal Court. We returned 118 of those same prisoners back to their respective jails. In September CSO's completed the longest transport of the year returning a female felony suspect to Pierce County Jail from Ellensburg PD. We continue to provide expanded court security due to increased number of Traffic Court hearings and the additional court sessions. CSO's also provide between 16 and 28 hours of Court Security for Bonney Lake Municipal Court per week at Bonney Lake City Hall. Bonney Lake Municipal Court has added extra court sessions and also started day jail allowing prisoners a chance to serve their time in the courtroom instead of being jailed. CSO Flaherty also provides court ordered Electronic Home Monitoring for some offenders who have been convicted of Bonney Lake municipal charges. Electronic home detention reduces jail cost and allows offenders to work while serving their sentences. The EHM program in 2010 provided 136 days of monitoring for a savings of \$7750 in jail costs.



CSO's also share the responsibility of the BLPD Property/Evidence Room. Over 1187 items of evidence or found property were collected in 2010 several hundred additional items were disposed of by destruction, auction, or returned to their owner. Items of value which are not claimed of owners unknown are now being auction by Property Room.Com. This change is very efficient and provides on-line viewing of all property being auctioned. Property Room.Com will return items to theft victims if they identify and prove ownership. Changes in the computer system are continuing in anticipation of future growth. In late fall a drug drop off box was placed in the PD Lobby. The PD joined with other local agencies and pharmacies in providing citizens a safe place to discard their out of date prescription drugs.

Throughout the year, CSO's have worked on a large variety of community and school events. The year began with tours of the Bonney Lake Police Department for local Cub Scouts. Packs from Lake Tapps and Bonney Lake fulfilled merit badge requirements by touring the Bonney Lake Police Department. CSO's also gave tours to the kindergarten and first grade classes from Crestwood Elementary School (Dec), Cedar River Academy (Jan). Favorite stops at the police department were the holding cells, the Patrol vehicle, and the SWAT armored vehicle.



CSO's visited local schools including: KinderCare Pre-School (Jan), BLPD CSO's attended the Emerald Hills Elementary School Carnival in June. The 911 simulator allowed the younger students a chance to practice calling 911, both how and when. The students also enjoyed the opportunity to tour a Patrol vehicle.

CSO's supported local businesses throughout the year with a variety of events and training. CSO's attended Safety Fairs at Lowes (Sept) and the Healthy Living Expo (July) at Allan Yorke Park. Crime Prevention and safety information were included at both events. Also in January a CSO attended the Bonney Lake City Council Pancake Breakfast at the Bonney Lake Senior Center. Personal safety and crime prevention procedures were discussed.

In early April, CSO Flaherty, Sgt. Sasaki and Officer Green coordinated BLPD's annual Citizens Academy. The Academy was in session through late May and gave local citizens an idea of the type of training received and situations encountered by BLPD officers. This year's Academy included firearms simulator training, and emergency vehicle operations (driving police cars).

The CSO's are responsible for developing and maintaining Block Watches within the City. Ongoing efforts are focused on local homeowner associations. Successful areas include Lake Bonney Home Owners Association (coordinated with Pierce County Safe Streets), Cedarview and Sky Island. Ongoing efforts are being made in Panorama Heights. Efforts continue to gather information and the make process of community involvement for interested neighborhood a simple process.

There were several major events this year beginning with National Night Out on the first Tuesday in August. This year's event, based on the more traditional format of local community's sponsorship of separate events generated more positive comments than any NNO event we have had recently. The efforts by the Lake Bonney Block Watch and the Cedarview Block Watch succeeded in giving National Night neighborhoods a feeling of ownership. The event held at two community parks in partnership with in the local block watches created more relaxed and informal event. Bonney Lake Police and East Pierce Fire caravanned to each location. Included in the caravan were numerous Police vehicles, SWAT armored vehicle and a Fire truck. Attendance at both locations exceeded our expectations. Target a national sponsor, was helpful in providing hotdogs and ice cream for the event. Clown Buggie, our Bonney Lake clowns in residence were also a hit with the neighborhoods. CSO's working with excellent support from Police Department, and City of Bonney Lake Officials and Staff coordinated the event.



The second major event in August was participation with other city staff in Bonney Lake Days. CSO's and BLPD volunteers brought a full range of crime prevention and personal safety information to the City of Bonney Lake's booth. Officers, volunteers, and CSO's were available for the one day event answering questions and meeting the public.

The third event in August was Touch a Truck at Cedarview City Park. The event was a much larger event than we expected. BLPD brought our Motorcycle, and two patrol vehicles. Approximately 120 Kids enjoyed our Police vehicle and the assorted trucks and graders from city shops. Sgt. Sasaki, Motor Officer Sainati, and Officer Wolschleger, and CSO's enjoyed the chance to meet with the kids at the park.

A fourth event in September was the dedication of the Bonney Lake Dog Park. McGruff joined by his CSO handler assisted the Mayor and City Council in opening the park. McGruff describe the park as "fetching".

The fifth major event was the BLPD/Public Safety Open House. The Public Safety Open House was held in the equipment bays of East Pierce Fire & Rescue. This event is a combined annual event held with East Pierce Fire. The Open House showcases each department's officers, specialty units, and volunteers. The BLPD displays included personnel from SWAT, K-9, Marine Services, Motor Patrol, Bicycle Patrol, CSO's, McGruff the Crime Dog, and our volunteers. Demonstrations and displays included K-9, SWAT equipment, the 911 Simulator, BLPD's Marine Service Boat, SWAT Armored Vehicle, Motorcycle, and the ID-A-Kid. Volunteers reported the highest turnout in several years.

We finished the year by participating in the Shop with a Cop program which was sponsored by Bonney Lake Target. CSO and SRO worked in early November soliciting donations from Target shoppers and over \$1000 was raised to support our December Shop With a Cop event. BLPD staff and volunteers also worked to support the Bonney Lake Giving Tree, Toys for Tots and Bonney Lake's annual food drive. This department wide effort made our agency look like Santa's workshop during the holiday.

The Volunteer program remained stable with six volunteers in 2010. Volunteers gave over 350 hours of time and energy to the police department in 2010. They were at every major event and deployed our radar trailers countless times throughout the year rain or shine.

Records and Administration

In 2010 Records unit consist of Tower and Amsbaugh in the front office. They handle most of the customer service including the front window and phones. As needed the records/detective assistant, Wigton will assist Tower and Amsbaugh, but for the most part Wigton is busily assisting Det. Boyle with P.A.T.R.O.L.

SECTOR is full board with patrol leaving less paper behind, however Records is busily entering SECTOR cases/MVC's for tracking purposes only in the RMS (records system).

During the 2010 Citizens Academy both Tower and Amsbaugh did an hour presentation on records, informing the students about Public Disclosure, Concealed Pistol License and general process of what goes on behind the scenes.

In 2010 Records changed their fingerprint hours to two specific hours during the day to allow for less interruption of normal records work. Sumner and Puyallup School District continue to send their employees to our location for convenience of hours and day available.

The entire records division continues to provide the public with outstanding, professional, friendly service.

It was an exciting year for the Bonney Lake Police Department's Marine Services Unit (MSU). What made it exciting? The arrival of our new patrol vessel! The new patrol vessel is a 2008 21' Aluminum Chambered Boat. The new vessel is fully outfitted to handle every situation on the lake. Officers have taken great pride in the boat and it is quite impressive to see on the water. I've heard nothing but good comments from city staff and citizens. Funding for the vessel was provided by the police department's drug fund.

The MSU participated in the usual community events; Bonney Lake Days, National Night Out, 4th of July, Memorial & Labor Day holidays. In addition, the MSU assisted with a large triathlon at and around Allen Yorke Park. Although the weather was poor at times throughout the summer the events maintained a good turnout. The MSU provided security & protection to the triathlon swimmers and helped with crowd control at the park. Water safety was taught at Mountain View Junior High School for the first time this year and it was well received. The MSU also taught water safety at the Bonney Lake Elementary School and assisted with East Pierce Fire & Rescue with their water safety classes for local pre-school age children.

MSU increased its vessel inspections and enforcement from years past. Much of this activity was from grant required activity, extra patrols and the addition of new MSU officers. With many new MSU members over the last 2 years, this gives the MSU a renewed sense of duty and enthusiasm for marine enforcement. As in years past, Officer Vince Sainati taught at the Basic Marine Law Enforcement Academy in Kennewick Washington

Allan Yorke Park

In 2010, the Bonney Lake Police Department once again staffed dedicated patrols at Allan Yorke Park. The purpose of these patrols is to prevent and minimize criminal activity in the park, by providing visible police presence during peak periods of use. Officers are directed to conduct traffic and parking enforcement, traffic control, foot patrol, bike patrol, boat launch and MSU assistance, as well as Skate park patrol. Officers support Bonney Lake Day, Friday Night Flicks, and Concerts in the park.

The summer of 2010 was cooler and wetter at the park than in recent history. The weather, along with reduced staffing resulted in lower numbers overall when compared to 2009.

This season officers added emphasis to parking problems, specifically in the boat trailer overflow parking lot. In recent years parking issues in this unmarked area have resulted in great frustration for citizens and officers. On days of heavy use it is common for vehicles to be parked in a completely disorganized manner resulting in numerous vehicles being blocked from exiting the parking lot. The lot is marked with signage stating that vehicles blocking others will be towed. All lots were marked by Cascade Towing as required by statute to allow for private impounds. Over the summer a total of 7 vehicles were impounded from the park for private impounds.

In general, numbers of contacts and violations were down from 2009 more than likely due to the combination of decreased staffing and poor weather. BLPD officers worked a total of 223 Park Patrol hours at the park, making a total of 2008 contacts. Warnings were given on 78 non-traffic related violations. Thirty trespass notifications were given. 108 Traffic violations were recorded resulting in 40 NOIs and 20 Criminal Traffic arrests. Sixty one parking violations were reported, resulting in 17 NOIs issued and 7 vehicles impounded. In addition Park Patrol Officers responded to assist patrol on calls 25 times. Marine Services Unit was assisted on 11 occasions.

Field Training Officer Program

The Bonney Lake Police Department's Field Training Officer Program consists of two functions, training full-time police officers as well as reserve officers. 2010 was very productive for the program as our two newest officer's, Tobie Johnston and Brian Kelly successfully completed the program and were subsequently released from probation. The Field Training Officers were required to conduct monthly observation reports on each officer until their probation periods were completed. No new officers were added to the department in the 2010 calendar year.

Field Training Officer Program Con't

The Field Training Officers have been busy with training our two Reserve Police Officers Ryan Harberts and Lance Panush. Both officers successfully complete the Washington State Basic Reserve Officer's Law Enforcement Academy in November, 2009. The Bonney Lake Police Department requires a minimum 20 hours of commitment each month to the Reserve Officer Program. The Reserve Officer Program is broken up into different phases or levels of training based on hours worked, knowledge gained and a Reserve Officer's abilities. Both officers have exceeded the minimum 20 hour requirement. Officer Harberts completed 258 hours of training and Officer Panush completed 275 hours respectively. It should be noted that all the hours each officer completes is with a Field Training Officer at their side teaching them what to do.

The Field Training Program implemented a new Field Training Manual in 2010. The manual consists of three phases. The first phase consists of mainly orientation and familiarization of the police work, our police department and the City of Bonney Lake. Phases two and three are the meat and potatoes of the program. Upon completion of the three phases each recruit will have completed several hundred hours of training.

K-9 Program

2010 continued to bring challenges and changes to the Bonney Lake Police Department's Narcotics Detection K-9 Unit, now in its third year. The ever changing search & seizure case law in the United States and in Washington State continue to limit vehicle searches during arrests nation & state wide. The affect of the case law severely decreased the use of narcotics detection dogs at the street level during traffic stops. With a limited amount of applications in 2010, Narcotics K-9 Officer Brian VanSickle and his partner, "Gunner", were again unable to match their

first year's stats. A positive affect of this situation gave Ofc. VanSickle a better working Knowledge of search & seizure procedures and he was able to pass his knowledge onto his peers in the patrol staff.

Ofc. VanSickle and Gunner had approximately had approximately 30 "sniffs" in 2010 down from 83 in 2009. Many of these were positive for drugs, mostly Marijuana. A "sniff" is the type locating method or application defined by their training and is typically not referred to as a "search" by the Narcotics K-9 Team. During many of these calls, Gunner was deployed on multiple sniffs of various vehicles and structures. The Bonney Lake Police Department's Narcotics K-9 Team assisted many agencies in the area including Buckley PD, Puyallup PD, Lakewood PD, Tacoma PD, Fife PD, Sumner PD, Pierce County Sheriff's Office and the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA). Ofc. VanSickle and Gunner are members of the Pierce County Metro K-9 Unit, a cooperative K-9 group for Generalist (Tracking/Capture) and Narcotic Detection K-9 Teams in Pierce County.

A goal for the K-9 Unit for 2011 is to look into adding or switching to a Generalist dog for the police department. With the very limited use of a narcotics K-9s now, a tracking/capture dog may be utilized more often by the department in the future. Growth of the area, possible city annexations and a lack of a Generalist dog on the plateau would be things to consider for 2011.



Crime and Statistics

Overall, National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) statistics were up by 5.3% in 2010 compared to 2009. In 2009, Bonney Lake Police evolved from Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) to NIBRS. One formidable advantage of the UCR/NIBRS immersion allows for a more thorough, and comprehensive depiction of the data. This allows researchers a better chance of [studying](#) crime and criminal behavior. The NIBRS collects data based upon both the victim, and the offender, it also includes information regardless if an arrest was made. In addition, the NIBRS provides knowledge about an individual's characteristics, such as ethnicity, age, and gender. This provides analysts with supplementary material about the perpetrator. The NIBRS centralizes their data collection on 22 sub-classification of offenses, which are then classified into 46 distinct infractions. This system allows more information regarding both victim and perpetrators than the older version of the UCR

The most significant decrease noted is the number of reported forcible sex offenses. 27 forcible sex offenses were reported in 2009, while only 13 were reported in 2010 resulting in a decrease by 51.9%. A remarkable decrease can be seen with Simple Assaults. 198 Simple Assaults were reported in while only 115 were reported in 2010. This resulted in a decrease by 41.9%. Unfortunately, this decrease is off set by an increase of 42.9% in reported Aggravated Assaults. Weapons Law Violations also increased from 6 incidents in 2009 to 20 total incidents in 2010.




